

Peel Public Health reports that 64 per cent of residents who tested positive work in essential industries.




York Region reports that 40 per cent of outbreaks were in food and product/materials manufacturing.







The red areas indicate neighbourhoods where residents are lower income relative to Toronto CMA average.








### Meeting basic, fundamental needs

- A transitional shelter for women and families




